Pre-Construction



Site analysis
All landscape elements and features are recorded and analysed during the Site Analysis phase.



Site analysis
It is identified that the view of the River Tay could be maximised through delicate removal of a section of the Beech hedge.

analysis reveals poor positioning of pre-existing benches.



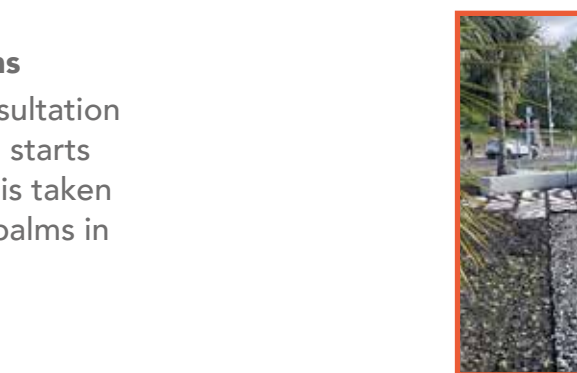
Concept > Construction



Construction begins
After a lengthy consultation period construction starts to take place. Care is taken to leave Cordyline palms in place.



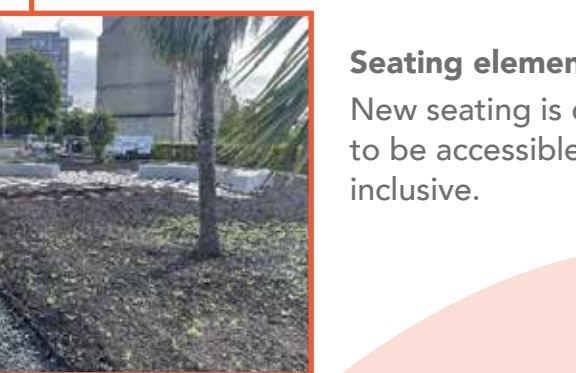
Concept drawings

Railway Tracks
Pay homage to former industry particularly Seabraes railway yard and engine shed which was located at the bottom of the embankment.



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Seating elements
New seating is designed to be accessible and inclusive.

Gravel Mulch
A 10mm gravel mulch is chosen to suppress weeds and keep slugs at bay.



Sustainable Landscape
The new perennial planting is far more sustainable as the perennial plants live far longer than annual bedding plants of the past which need to be planted yearly. Costing a huge amount of resource.



Biodiversity
The new greenspace has already seen a huge uptake in invertebrates. Providing a valuable source of food for bees and butterfly's.
